

Najaf Chronicles By Rick LaRoche

UWSS member, Rick LaRoche, who works for the US State Department as Action Officer for Najaf, continues to share short narratives of his life and feelings as he carries out his sometimes dangerous duties in Iraq.

November 2004: Greetings from a rainy and muddy Najaf, home of the "world famous Najaf Men's Garment Factory" as the sign at the city limits proudly proclaims. Well, aside from the U.S. elections, the big news here is that we have moved from good old Camp Baker to Camp Hotel, which is definitely not even close to what the name implies. The base is large and provides ample room for running (2 mile circuit) if and when I have time. It also has a tent with weights, but I haven't checked it out yet. We have such luxuries as a 24-hour laundry service. As one of the people here put it: "The laundry here is where your clothes go to die!" I hardly recognize what I get back. Did I really buy pink underwear? Have I gained that much weight in 24 hours?

As I write this, It is Tuesday (11/2) in Iraq, but still very early in the U.S. This is the big day the world is watching. Iraq itself seems to have the following split: Baghdad residents (not the government) favor Kerry; everywhere else seems to favor Bush. The "infamous" Sunni Triangle" continues to favor Sadam. I guess they missed the message that he is not running for president in the U.S. or Iraq!

On a recent trip to Hillah (1hour north of Najaf), our gunship (code name for the rear vehicle) and its "roadrage discourager and ex-Navy SEAL" had to fire on three separate vehicles. The gunship is an SUV and has a "rather large caliber" machine gun mounted in the cargo space. It also has a HUGE sign in Arabic warning: "Keep your distance or deadly force will be used." Despite this drivers continue to speed up to our 3-car convoy when we stop at checkpoints and intersections. Given the deadly use of suicide car-bombers here, we simply cannot let any vehicle get to close to us. Our "tailgunner" waves them back, throws flares and fires a warning shot onto the road in front of them. If they continue, he then fires a volley into the engine block, which usually does the trick. It's better to shoot the car than the driver. After all, we are still trying to win hearts and minds.

Speaking of that, we had packaged up about 100 bags of food for poor families that we intended to give out during Ramadan. Whenever we drive through poor areas (especially rural areas), we try to throw out food, candy and toys from the last vehicle. We cannot afford to stop for security reasons. At any rate, the bags of food simply "disappeared during the move from Baker to Hotel. It seems that the Iraqi movers, who are already making "big bucks" by Iraqi standards, stole the food for themselves. It's impossible to say exactly which group

did it, so there is nothing we can do. It gets very frustrating when you see the "thug-thief" mentality that Sadam bred here for so many years. Everyone is into some type of corruption or graft. The lines of cars waiting to get gas stretch for miles due to an "official" shortage of fuel. Yet Iraqi Police are notorious for barging to the front of the line in their private vehicles, filling them up along with every container they can find. And surprise, surprise, the Black Market for gas is alive and healthy. There's always plenty of fuel there!

I took my first regional break to Stockholm at the end of October. Boy, did I ever need that. Hanne kept looking at me as if I was crazy when I was amazed to find the following: 1) Hot water on demand (we have to wait about 5 minutes). 2) Electricity that stays on 24 hrs. 3) INDOOR TOILETS AND SHOWERS- WOW! And 4) People actually walking around and enjoying life - some of them even smiling and laughing. I never see people smiling and laughing here. I still felt uncomfortable if a car got too close to us, however. Anyway, I arrived on a Monday and left six days later. It wasn't long, but it helped tremendously. Poor Hanne, I was so tired I slept a good portion of the time I was there. I'm already counting the days to my next break, which will be longer. I get to spend two weeks at Christmas. That will also mean I will have completed one-third of my tour in Iraq. And speaking of that, I got my onward assignment once I'm done here. I got my top choice (Stockholm wasn't on the bid list) - Auckland, New Zealand! "Just throw me right back into the briar patch." ©

Hanne and I are already surfing the web looking for information about the city. We will be living in a fourbedroom house in the Auckland suburb of Ponsonby. It seems to be a great place to live. The Consulate is small, but we have a large reporting area: Samoa, Cook Islands, Antarctica (a real "garden spot" I've heard) and a few other small island territories. And let's not forget that NZ is known for extreme sports and rugby. Just my cup of tea. I'm looking forward to it, but I must admit, it will seem strange to exchange my AK-47, K-Bar knife, Glock 9 mm and body armor for a suit and tie. I'm also wondering how well I'll make the switch from exciting and dangerous nation-building to stamping visas (my next tour is a consular tour). Life may be crazy here in Iraq, but it is addictive for adrenalin-junkies, which is what most of us here in Iraq are. Whatever the case, I have promised Hanne that this is my last "dangerous" assignment, so I'll just have to get used embassy life again⊚

To all my friends out there, please take care and enjoy your lives, loved ones and friends. Never take these things for granted. It's going to take a long time for the poor people of Iraq to be able to do this. At least when I leave, I will be able to say that I have done my part to try and help those Iraqis who want to be helped. "Inshallaha," (God willing) they will have these things that we in the free world take for granted.
