



A Son's Quest

Last February buddyline@uwss.org received the following email from Ted Eckert of Richmond, Virginia.

Sir: I visited the UWSS Website today and found my father's photo in the August 2001 edition of the Buddyline. My father was Chief John G. Eckert, class date is May 19, 1961. He is kneeling with the hard hat in front row of the class photo submitted by Chris Seger. I have the very same photo hanging in my house.



John Eckert died 1981 and is buried at Arlington National. I think he would have gotten a big kick getting together with some of his UWSS buds. He went on to finish EOD school in Indian Head, served a couple years in EODU-1 Hawaii, finished up at Lake Mead Naval Base, Las Vegas where he retired. He was pretty old school

Navy till the end of his days. Please pass on my very best wishes to all my Dad's classmates and to all the old Navy divers. We will not see the likes of them again.

Don Stone shared Ted's email with Chris Seger and Chris and Don exchanged several emails with Ted, sharing memories of UWSS school days, as Ted shared more about John Eckert's life and family.

Ted wrote, We were all very little in 1961 but I recall Dad coming home all brown from the sun and the stories of the school. Mostly I recall him talking about the friends and connections he made while going through the school and some of the funnier events. There was a story about the group out jogging and needing to post guards so certain members wouldn't "drop out" at the bars. Dad taught us all the basics of SCUBA in Hawaii although only my sister and I ended up getting certified later in life. My siblings and I all appreciate

the contact and memories connected to the UWSS and Dad's buds in EOD and the Navy.

I'd like one of the *UWSS* coins to place on Dad's stone in Arlington. I'd also like an embroidered cap which I'd wear with pride. I'm good with wearing Navy stuff even though I ended up in Vietnam in 1969-70 as a Marine. See. the acorn really



didn't fall that far from the tree.

I want to thank you for the UWSS connection to my father. It has meant a great deal to me and John Eckert's family as a whole. His 3 surviving sisters traveled from CA and NC to join me and Mary (my wife) to visit Arlington. I left the medallion at the stone, pushing it into the ground below the name and dates. It was a very moving event and I cannot thank you enough for making this possible.

Farewell Jack Bennett

UWSS member Jack Bennett lost his battle with cancer August 23, 2009. Aaron Farrior sends these memories of his friend.

As I sit here and think about when Jack and I went to UWSS Key West...many memories have come to me..this was in Aug-Sept 1962...At one point I never thought he would make it.. on a Night Scuba Swim Jack and his swim buddy took a 180 wrong compass heading as soon as they left the boat...A boat stayed with them as they headed for Cuba.. They swam til they ran out of air....When they came up they were told to turn around and swim all the way back to the beach with tanks on the surface....He wouldn't quit..That wasn't his style We graduated together...

In the 15 years that followed we were team mates in the Air Rescue service...Jack was one of the first PJ'S to fly Rescue in combat in Viet Nam aboard the HH-43 Helio....He received many decorations for participating in rescuing American Pilots from Laos and North Viet Nam...He is survived by his lovely wife Patty...He will be greatly missed.

The Way It Was

Cast and Recovery was a technique originated by UDT during WWII, first used at the invasion of Iwo Jima, and taught at UWSS.

In this early UWSS photo the swimmers are being recovered by a team member equipped with a looped sling.

In a combat situation, if the swimmer missed the sling or couldn't get on the IBS fast enough, he could mess the pickup for the remaining men in the line of swimmers and the boat might not be able to safely make a second run.



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
