
Crossing the Bar

We regret to report the passing of Captain William S. Cadow, Jr. USN (Ret.) on Friday, January 26, 2007, a result of complications following triple bypass surgery.

Bill commenced his Naval Career in 1959, later attended and graduated from Underwater Swimmers School with Class 8/61. He then followed the normal Naval Career pattern for a young EOD Officer and in gaining seniority he was given command of the Naval EOD Technology Center. Subsequent to that command Bill became Commodore of EOD Group I in Hawaii with responsibilities for all EOD tasks in the Pacific Basin. While in this position he was instrumental in getting several Naval Marine Mammal Systems under the operational control of Naval EOD. Bill retired as Commodore of EOD Group I in 1986 after a distinguished Naval Career.

He will be missed. Rest in Peace, Bill.

UWSS member, Rick LaRoche, who worked for the US State Department as Action Officer for Najaf, shared short narratives of his life and feelings as he carried out his sometimes dangerous duties in Iraq. This is the last of his Najaf Chronicles, sent in February 2005.. Rick is now stationed in New Zealand where life is less exciting and definitely less hazardous

Shuku Maku (what's happening)? Greetings from the heartland of Shi'ia Islam, the Holy City of Najaf. I apologize for the long delay in sending out this issue of the Najaf Chronicles. Ever since I returned from my first long R&R (nearly 3 weeks in Sweden), I have been swamped trying to get ready for Iraq's first free elections. Najaf is once again returning - if it ever left - to the center of focus in Iraq. The elections, I'm happy to say, were a resounding success here. Najafis have been forced to cope with a long line of dictators, thugs and radicals, all the while trying to lead as normal a life as possible.

Consequently, it was thrilling and inspiring to watch these brave people dress up in their finest, get out early on Election Day and walk to the polling stations to cast their votes. It was an almost carnival-like atmosphere. People laughed, joked and danced after they voted, while they women gave their distinctive, traditional "Middle-Eastern" wail of joy and or sorrow. Najafis held up ink-stained fingers to prove they had voted, almost as if it were a badge of courage. And the more I think about, it did prove their bravery. Sunni (read Wahabi) insurgents had promised to "make the streets of Najaf run red with the blood of anyone who voted." They threatened to use car bombs, suicide bombers and snipers. Every Najafi I spoke to told me how scared he or she was to vote. It may cost me my life, but I am determined to do it, one young woman told me.

As I mentioned in the beginning, Election Day came and went with no violence here other than the normal "heckling" that rival political parties do even in the U.S. Of course, that doesn't mean that we are out of the woods yet. The Coalition Forces captured a couple of top aids to al-Zaqari just a few days before the elections. There is a pretty good chance that the "bad guys" decided that their attacks to disrupt the elections had been compromised and therefore simply postponed them. The old "run, run, run away - live to fight another day" syndrome may well be at work here. I would not be surprised to see renewed attacks in Najaf once the election results have been announced.

Without getting to deep into specifics, it would be fair to say that the "political situation" in Najaf is heating up tremendously. The two major parties are slinging insults and accusations of voter manipulation and election violations at each other. Moreover, they are jockeying for position and gathering forces for what could spawn a new outbreak of violence. Last Friday the Kufa Mosque, the scene of the very first inflammatory sermons that Muqtada al-Sadr delivered prior to the heavy fighting in August, re-opened for the first time since August. And guess who is supposed to start preaching there again? Yep, you guessed it – our good buddy and friend of America and democracy Muqtada al-Sadr himself.

Now, to further complicate matters, the local chief of police, who has been accused of corruption, incompetence, working with Iranian intelligence and a host of other equally morally offensive crimes, refuses to step down from office. Despite being directed by the Iraqi government to resign, he has said that no one can get him out of office. He has fortified police headquarters, summoned all the police loyal to him and told his men to shoot anyone who tries to enter the station. You just gotta love this guy! But wait! He's not alone! The head of another security force in Najaf has also gathered his troops, the majority of whom are known for violating the rights of the locals by beating and torturing them, and is also gearing up to protect his interests.


Let's see if we can complicate the situation even more! Oh yes, we can. It's time for the annual Shi'ia period of mourning called "Ashura." Familiar from news broadcasts around the world, this is the incredible procession where thousands of devout Shi'ia Muslims march through the streets of Najaf and Karballa as they flail themselves with chains, whips and swords. Most of the participants bleed copiously from scalp, back and shoulder wounds. The procession is to pay tribute to a Shi'ia Amam, who martyred himself some 1,300 years ago while trying to oppose a dictator. During Ashura, participants enter an extremely excited and agitated state, where almost anything is possible. For those readers who may be wondering what kind of a religion does things like this, let me remind you of the numerous crucifixions re-enacted every Easter in the Philippines!

Well for me, it's just another Friday, which is basically the only day of the week I can keep track of over here! I'm off to eat a long and leisurely lunch with my brothers (I am an "honorary" tribal member complete with full Sheik garb), the Sheiks of the Beni Hassan tribe. The Sheiks have a lovely place nestled among date palms on the banks of the Euphrates River. The entire floor of the Eating Hall is covered in fine carpets and filled with food: fish, chicken, lamb and all kinds of vegetables and fruit. Following the meal, we usually recline on the many cushions, drink coffee or tea and talk about life. No one is allowed to talk business! The head of the tribe (63years-young) often entertains us with stories about his four wives, their jewelry and their tattoos. This time, he has promised to reveal the secret of his, as he puts it, incredible virility. I can't wait to hear his time-tested secret. These guys really know how to live. That's all for now. And yes, I plan to share the secret with anyone who is interested!
