SEALs & UWSS Featured in Key West Citizen Story

Key West residents of Truman Annex were startled last month by the sound of gunfire and some called the police for answers. It was just the SEALs in town again engaged in a training exercise involving blank gunfire.

While researching the history of Navy Special Ops training in Key West, Citizen staff writer Adam Linhardt found the UWSS web site and telephoned Don Stone. Adam's questions encouraged Don to reminisce about UWSS in the 50's and early 60's. With Linhardt's permission we share excerpts from his story (shown in italics).

During the war, most future operators had trained in Fort Pierce, where the Navy SEAL Museum is now located. In those early years, the SEAL Teams had yet to be officially formed, but their history is directly linked to the Underwater Demolitions Teams — or UDT operators — from which the SEAL Teams would evolve.

Many of those early UDT men on the East Coast rotated through Key West, where instructors like Stone taught them to dive. "It was challenging for most in that you have to keep going regardless of whether you were tired or scared," Stone said. "The guys who made it were men."

"The old school was located at the corner of Front Street", said Monroe County historian Tom Hambright. "The guys would run five miles around the island before breakfast and people would scream at them as they ran and sang their cadence. The guys who wore hard hats while diving were here, too. The conditions for that kind of training here are ideal and it continues to be."

"Key West plays an important role," said Navy SEAL Museum Executive Director and retired SEAL Rick Kaiser. "It did then and it continues to, because it's the best place to learn. There's clear water day and night. You can hone your skills in Key West before entering a nasty harbor in 'country X.' It's just an invaluable place."

Lt. David Lloyd, spokesman for Little Creek, Vabased Naval Special Warfare Group Two, reiterated that in an email to The Citizen following the training exercise.

"Key West offers a unique environment of waterways, consistent water temperature and challenging currents that test and refine our abilities in preparation for real world strategic operations," Lloyd wrote.

Stone's recollection of the old swimmers' school is evidence that as much as things change, they often remain the same. Though techniques and monikers for the forces have evolved over the years, the core training and Key West's role therein remains relatively static.

Folks, we live on a huge, diverse, wonderful and free continent. Thanks to all of you and those that have worn the Uniforms of the United States Military.



A Diver's Story

In remembering the past and all the good and exciting times, I wrote this short biographical sketch and included a relevant and historical spear fishing contest banner. **Mickey Kappes - Merritt Island, Florida**

I started skin diving and spear fishing in Long Island waters in1951, and in 1953 while a cadet at the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy, I founded the "Trident Club" with life-long diving buddy Rudy Enders who went on to be UWSS/XO. The club was active for almost 40 years and many Kings Point cadets enjoyed their first introduction to the wondrous undersea world that existed beneath the hulls of the ships they would sail as Merchant Marine or Naval Officers. As part of my active duty Navy time in EOD, I graduated from the Underwater Swimmers School (UWSS) in Key West on 12 October 1956.

As a civilian, in late1958, I accepted a contract to try to determine the cause of a crash of a Cubana Airlines flight which went down in shallow waters off the Cuban coast. The Batista government blamed it on a bomb planted by Cuban (Castro) rebels while the rebels claimed a Cuban Air Force fighter shot it down. It was believed that if the aircraft could be located and photographed, it would be evident that either an onboard bomb went off or that incoming bullet holes would prove an aircraft shoot- down. However, immediately after my arrival in Havana, I learned that the Cuban government had already located and raised the aircraft remains and put out the story of a rebel bomb planted aboard.

Being single and unemployed, I decided to stay in Cuba and was in Havana when Fidel and his bearded guerrillas marched into town a few weeks later. I met several Cuban divers and started a diving and salvage business. For the first year under Castro, before the communist flag was raised high (the honeymoon period), business was good.

A highlight of my first year residing in Cuba was participating in the first post-revolution "Campeonato Nacional de Caza Submarina" (National Spearfishing Championships) held in Varadero Beach on 20-21 June 1959. Each 3-man team was assigned a 100 meter wide zone running

from the beach out to deep water. No SCUBA allowed – total team weight of anything speared counted. I was quite amazed to observe that the 3-man team to one side consisted of bearded fellows including Fidel Castro himself. We came in second but happily beat Fidel's team.



By the end of an almost two-year stay in Havana, life was getting economically difficult and politically dangerous. In October 1960, heeding an urgent warning from a good friend in the U.S. Embassy, I made a hasty departure from Havana. While transiting Miami on my way to ship out again in the Merchant Marine, I was contacted and recruited by the CIA. A promise of four months employment evolved into a rewarding 47-year Agency career which included an exciting operational 125 ft. dive with a Navy SEAL in unfriendly waters during an extended paramilitary assignment and recreational diving in many parts of the world during my 20 years overseas.

At age 81, it may be time to hang up my flippers, and if I can't shoot my age on the golf course, I may try to free-dive my age (feet not fathoms) down in the Keys.




Richard Lively's Class




From the Mailbag - continued

These photos are from the UWSS graduating class on March 27, 1964. In the small photo is Joe Battle (5th group SF, deceased) on the left and Peter Noonan,(1st group SF Okinawa) on the right. We were in the Special Forces training group at Ft. Bragg, N. C. when we were selected to go TDY to Key West, Fla. for underwater training.. Most of the class were navy personal and they were just starting to train 'Green Berets'. I utilized my UWSS training later when I was deployed to the 1st SF group on Okinawa in the fall of 1964 and was assigned to the newly formed 'Scuba school' and later saw duty on the submarine (forget the name for now) and was active on SF operations in and around the south China sea; including South Korea.
