The benefits to the FO/UWSS are the savings on printing and postage for the Buddy Line mailout.



At the banquet, MC Bob (Doc) Clark did a great job, as usual. Featured speaker was Clell Breining, Force Master Chief of Navy Special Warefare with a SpecWar update and information on the new rating system. We also heard from Army Special Forces M/Sgt Earle Petty; Air Force PJ, M/Sgt Aaron Farrior; and Canadian Gerry Flowers, a US Force Recon Marine, who told how their UWSS experience benefited their military careers. Dr. Charlie Aquadro reminisced about some of his interesting life experiences.





UWSS member, Rick LaRoche, who works for the US State Department spent a year in Iraq as Provincial Action Officer for Najaf. While there, he shared short narratives of his life and feelings as he carried out his sometimes dangerous duties

October 8, 2004 Greetings to all from downtown sunny Najaf. A tropical paradise in the making (just add water). Much has happened here since the last edition of the Chronicles. We have received mortar rounds as a gentle reminder that the bad guys are still out there, as well as several threats of an imminent attack on the camp (apparently imminent means something different in Arabic since they did not attack). I had the opportunity a couple of weeks ago to write a "brief" for the President, the National Security Advisor, the Secretary of State and the Deputy Secretary of State prior to their meeting with the Iraqi Prime Minister. Guess if I was nervous. I didn't hear anything back, so I guess they were happy with it. It was quite an experience for me.

Otherwise, the big news here was what we lovingly refer to as a "Dog & Pony Show." The Ambassador and a high-ranking Minister from the Iraqi government and a "cast of thousands" descended on us a few days ago to visit some reconstruction sites. As control officer and Senior State Department Official in the Province of Najaf (I kind of like that title©), I was tasked with planning and executing the mission. What was supposed to be a "lowkey" (for security reasons) trip got really out-of-hand quickly. By the time we rolled out of camp, we had a convoy of 27 (count 'em) vehicles that left a footprint bigger than that of King Kong smashing his way through New York City.

To complicate the situation further, it was decided (I advised against this detour, but was overruled) to drive through the areas of recent fighting and heavy destruction close to the Holy Shrine, where al-Sadr and his "boogar-eaters" held up until we let them off the hook. Needless to say, the people living and working in that area are not really happy about everything that happened and were not at all pleased to see us. We stopped, took a few photos and continued on our way. We were escorted by the local Iraqi police, who possess the tracking and navigational skills of a deaf, dumb and blind paraplegic. Shortly after leaving the city limits, we were hopelessly lost, thanks to the well-honed local knowledge of our hosts. Thank God for GPS! A quick readout and we were on the right trail again.

The following day, the Governor had invited me to visit the Holy Shrine in a somewhat smaller group. The Holy Shrine (Imam Ali) is one of the holiest sites in the world for Shiites and was the site of the recent fighting in

Najaf. It stands in front of the largest cemetery in the world. Folks, you can drop about 50 Arlington Cemeteries in this place and still have room for a small city. It's enormous! Shiites believe that if you are buried here, you will not have to be judged by the prerequisite "two angles" before entering paradise. These guys are looking for ways to beat the system even after they've died. Anyway, we followed the same route that we had taken the day before (but a few hours earlier in case there were any bad guys around). As we rounded a corner, we saw a "roadblock' (debris piled in the road) that had not been there less than 24 hours ago. Immediately, the "pucker-factor" soared off the scale as we thought: "ambush!" The roadblock was placed right in front of three multistory buildings heavily damaged from artillery fire (great for snipers). We had to stop dead, make a 3-point U-turn and head back the way we came.

By now, we were really spooked and so was the Deputy Governor. Finally, rather than abort the mission we found another small street right through the heart of the Old City to get to the Shrine. I got out and took some photographs, was photographed myself as the "first American to visit the Shrine since early August" and left again in a hurry. Although things have been calm by Najaf standards recently, Ramadan is approaching and that always brings on more attacks here. Moreover, this Ramadan is special, as it coincides for the first time in many years with the anniversary of the Battle of Badr. The Battle of Badr took place in 624 and is believed to have been the first major battle between the newly established religion of Islam and "non-believers" (that's us, folks). The Prophet Mohammed himself commanded the troops! Religious extremists looking for that "something extra" to spur the boys on may well take advantage of this!

I believe that the insurgents will "throw everything at us but the kitchen sink" between now and the elections in January. This is their last window of opportunity to try to destabilize the country before Iraqis get their own "democratically elected" government. It will be interesting to see how we respond to their challenge. Locals I have spoken with cannot comprehend why we don't do anything about Falluja and other areas where insurgents have control. I am constantly asked: "Why don't you go in and wipe them out? This is what we want the US to do." Of course, these are Shiites speaking, and they are not particularly fond of the Sunnis, so I guess we should take this with the "proverbial grain of salt. Seriously, our actions in these areas will have a tremendous impact on achieving the level of security needed to have safe and peaceful elections in Iraq. We need to be tough. In a culture of violence, this is what people understand best.

Until the next edition, enjoy life and don't forget the wise words of the Dali Lama: "Judge your success by what you had to give up in order to get it."
