Reunion 2017 Update

Shipmates, this assignment of arranging the next reunion has been a challenge, but obstacles were overcome and it has been set in stone. Our preferred date was the first weekend in May, 2017, however accommodations were hard to find on base. Gateway Inns have several lodging facilities in the area, but a place to hold our meetings and banquet was distant.

We had the Gateway on the main Base secured and meeting place at Anchors facility for meeting on May 18-20. As it happens, our President Bob Bureker, was in San Diego and inspected Gateway and found it to be unsuitable for our group. At the same time, Anchors informed me there was a "Sweet 16" party booked for half of the room, the day of our banquet. (think on that).

The San Diego Convention Chairman communicated our reunion needs and 31 venues replied. After a few weeks of phone calls, that list was pared down to two hotels that fit our needs and were in our room price range. With the help of Master Diver Trey Williams of the Consolidated Dive Locker, who made the site visits, we have selected the Holiday Inn Bayside for our reunion on the preferred date of May 4th, 5th and 6th, 2017.

This is one of those scrambles that worked out in our favor. Our room rate is more than Gateway but very reasonable for the San Diego area. The Inn is waiving their \$10 a day parking fee and providing free 24 hour airport shuttle, 10% discounts at their highly rated restaurant for attendees over 55, and a complimentary hospitality room where we can bring in our own beverages and snacks.

Master Diver Williams is assisting us in securing a venue for our Friday cook-out. We remember the parties at the Beach Patio so this will be like old times without the instructors challenging us to do push-ups or swimming to the buoy!

We plan on having a tour of the Consolidated Dive Unit and, of course, a visit to the Shark Rider, which was transported to San Diego when the school in Key West was closed. For those members that are not retired and holding a grey ID card, we can arrange for base access by name.

There are many interesting and fun attractions and activities in the area. By signing up in advance, we can secure tickets from the base ITT office at good discounts, up to 50% off. Holiday Inn Bayside has extended our reunion room rate up to three days before and three days after the reunion for those who want to enjoy more of San Diego.

The Executive Corner Bob Bureker, President

The last couple of months have been heavy duty travel times for this old salt. We participated in the Navy EOD Group One family day at Gator Beach North Island, CA. where we recruited eleven new members for the NavyEODA.com. Then we were off to the same sort of function for the Navy EOD Group in Virginia Beach, VA., adding fourteen new members at that family day. Attendance at the National EOD Association Convention in Fayetteville, NC. was followed by a road trip to San Diego where I was honored to be the guest speaker for the "Military Order of the World Wars" meeting.

The trips to San Diego made it possible for me to help our hard working reunion chairman, Dave Gholson, who is working with his San Diego contacts from his home in Kentucky. We have done considerable leg work and investigation for him on the 2017 San Diego Reunion location. Things were looking good for using Gateway until Dalia and I checked out the facilities in detail and talked with the Director. The rooms available to our group were on three levels with no elevators and there was no way to make sure our group would get ground floor units The rooms were in the process of being remodeled and even the one we saw in progress was not really satisfactory. It was very old, extremely tight, and certainly not worth \$89 a night.

After considerable walking and inspecting several units, we met with the Director, and found out from our conversation with him that 500 Midshipmen would be coming on base for housing at the same time of our planned reunion date. They are active duty and of course that means they take priority so our people would not be able to make reservations during that time period. All that leg work and discussion was for nothing it was a "no go" due to active duty priority.

Plan two, maybe we could book rooms at the North Island facility? Great facility and all Gateway and Navy Lodge are newer than those on the Naval Base San Diego. Sorry to report they only make reservations 30 days in advance and we would be on the bottom of that priority list as well. The Navy Lodge is great but that also means they are usually booked solid.

We were told by the leaders in the Dive Locker on the "wet" side of the Base that we should try Town and Country Resort where the local military diver group held a reunion. Meanwhile Dave Gholson's contact with the San Diego Chamber of Commerce resulted in bids from many hotels wanting to host our reunion, most of them way too expensive. Dave selected the locally recommended Town and Country Resort and the Holiday Inn Bayside with great rates for San Diego area and excellent support for the Reunion.

While I was in San Diego I took the opportunity to stay overnight and check out the prospective hotel "Holiday Inn Bayside" for the reunion. It is a nice facility that appears to be recently remodeled with comfortable rooms. It meets all our requirements for cost and availability for the dates we want. They have military units meeting there guite often and had a VP Squadron reunion there while I was there. The hotel is just across the street from a small Navy Facility with very limited exchange. The hotel provides a free shuttle from/to the airport. There are several taxi cabs parked alongside the hotel and easy bus transportation across the street that takes you right into down town area or the USS Midway. Dalia and I have found that Bus rides can often be an interesting adventure.

There will be maps and highlights posted on the 2017 Reunion page of the website. Go there and take a look <u>www.uwss.org</u>. Sea World, Balboa Park and Zoo tickets can be arranged for through their respective websites with deep discounts for retired military available. We were able to get free tickets to Sea World through <u>https://shop.id.me/</u>. It is easy to sign up and take advantage of discounts. San Diego now offers several breaks to those with a Military ID card. Also all the bases will allow cars on the base with just showing a Military ID. MWR has many discounts available and we will provide information on the website about where and how to make use of them.

Reunion Accommodations

Holiday Inn Bayside in San Diego has blocked a group of rooms for the UWSS 2017 Reunion and will accept reservations at the group rate of \$129 per day until April 13, 2017. California tax brings the total room cost to \$145.90 per day.

The group rate is available for three days before and three days after the reunion dates of May 4-6, 2017 (based on availability) for those who want to take advantage of some of the many activities and attractions in the area. Room reservations may be made by phone or on-line.

Please make your reservations early to help the reunion committee estimate attendance. Reservations may be changed or cancelled without charge up to three days before reservation date.

Passing the Bar

John Douglas Bartleson, Jr. "Bart"



CWO 4 John Douglas Bartleson Jr, USN Retired, FO/UWSS Plank Owner, passed away peacefully on Wednesday, October 12th, 2016.

Born in Ft. Myers, FL,. May 27, 1936, Bart was an avid outdoorsman.

He enlisted in the Navy in 1954 and served as Mineman and diver before transferring to Explosive Ordnance Disposal

(EOD). During his 30 year career, Bart made several contributions to the EOD Community, from authoring a 60 Series Civil War Ordnance EOD publication to serving as the Navy EOD Association Historian. He is a Plank Owner of EODGRP 2, Ft. Story, where he retired in December 1984.

Bart is survived by his wife Kay, daughters Ann, Pat and Lori, sons John and Mike, five grandchildren and five great grandchildren.



Robert "Doc" Clark

Master Chief Robert "Doc" Clark, USN, Retired, FO/UWSS Plank Owner, passed away on August 6, 2016. "Doc" was born on August 21, 1935 in Rochester, NY.

He served with the Marines as a Hospital Corpsman, then after Deep Sea Diving School, Escape Training Tank, Pearl Harbor, Army Jump School and Underwater

Swimmer School, Doc was assigned to UDT 21 and 22, SEAL Team 2 and Naval Special Warfare Group 2.

Doc served as Command Master Chief, Naval Hospital Patuxent River and SEAL Team 4 completing his 32 years of active duty. His numerous military awards include two Bronze Stars with Combat "V".

Active in many associations, Doc was an avid and loyal volunteer. He was loved and will be missed and remembered by his wife, Dee, sons, daughters, grandchildren, sister, and many "brothers" and friends.

William Bruhmuller III "Bill / Bruh"

William Bruhmuller, of Panama City, FL, passed away Friday, September 23, 2016 in Atlanta, GA, with his family by his side.

Born on August 10, 1935 in Malden, Massachusetts, Bill joined the navy at 17. As part of the Underwater Demolition Team (Class 13), he was one of 21 men who graduated from the original



class of 156. He spent the next 8 years assigned to UDT-21 and 22. In 1958, he was selected by NASA to participate in establishing benchmark endurance standards for astronauts.

Bill was a Plank Owner of SEAL Team 2 and served with the SEALs in Cuba, the Dominican Republic and Vietnam. He will be remembered for being the first SEAL dog handler in the history of the Teams. Bill retired in 1978 as Master Chief with 2 purple hearts. He is survived by his wife, Bette, six children and many grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Gideon Don "Indian" Checote



Navy Chief Retired, SFC (Diver) Gideon Don "Indian" Checote, 89, of Waynesboro, PA, passed away Sunday, October 9, 2016.

Born November 28, 1926, he grew up in rural Oklahoma, and entered the United States Navy in 1943. He served in WWII and in the Korean War. He earned an Associates

Degree from the Naval Technical College in D.C. He moved to Waynesboro in October 1990 where he was employed as a welder, working for the family business, Browns Welding of Waynesboro, along with his son and grandsons, for the past 27 years.

Don accumulated many stories over the years as the result of his military service, and he loved to tell those stories, especially to his children and grandchildren, whom he loved dearly.

He is survived by five children fifteen grandchildren; four great-grandchildren; one sister, and many nieces and nephews.

Origin of the Shark Rider

There have been many variations of the shark riding diver logo used over the years by UWSS, and more recently by FO/UWSS. The earliest example found in the archives is a poster about a decal contest in 1958 showing two examples of the entries below left, and the results below right.

Our most famous shark rider was completed in 1966 by Dow Byers and adorned the front of the school until it closed in 1973. It was then transferred to Navy Dive School, Coronado where it stayed until 1993, then transferred to CDU (now SWRMC) where it is proudly displayed to this day.

The way it was

"What were the qualifications for Scuba diver ?"

According to the UWSS instruction manual, the qualifications for scuba divers included the following Selection Requirements: Must be physically and psychologically qualified, and must be a first class or second class swimmer. Well unfortunately some trainees that came in the door were not.

The training program weeded out those that were really out of shape and those with



emotional problems such as claustrophobia who couldn't handle ditch and don in the pool, or basement ascents in the tank. During the scuba training phase, as the submerged students swam around the pool, instructors pulled off their face masks, fins, or mouth pieces to see how they handled themselves in emergency situations. Military Scuba divers had to be able to operate under

adverse conditions and handle unexpected and unsettling occurrences during a dive.
