New UWSS All-Service Coin

In response to the many suggestions and requests from UWSS graduates, we have commissioned an additional UWSS coin that honors graduates of all American armed services who trained at the school to become qualified underwater swimmers and divers.

The face of this coin is similar to our embroidered patch with the shark riding swimmer and the words "United States Navy Underwater Swimmer.

The reverse side has a raised rim and raised seals of all five American armed services. This two inch diameter coin is slightly larger

than our original UWSS coin so that the seals can be significantly portrayed. The all-service coin is now available for purchase from our gear locker at \$10.00 each.

"This is to notify you that **Daniel A. Barlow**, Plantation, Florida, a UWSS member, passed away on June 11, 2011. He fought a very courageous battle with cancer for a year, the only battle he ever lost. He was born in Orlando, Florida, January 10, 1933. In 1951 he moved to San Diego, CA and enlisted with the U.S. Navy, serving our country from 1951-1959, and left a Korean War Veteran. He served at the U.S. Training Center, San Diego, CA; U.S. Naval Station, Adak, Alaska; the U.S.S. Piedmont (AD17); the U.S.S. Dixie (AD14); the U.S.S. Howard W. Gilmore (AS 16) in Key West, FL, the U.S.S. Petrel (ASR14), and the U.S.S.



Bushnell (AS 15).

He graduated from the U.S. Naval School of Underwater Swimmers on the third of February 1956. In 1957 he completed the prescribed course of instruction at the U.S. Naval School (Salvage), New York Naval Shipyard, Bayonne Annex, Bayonne, New Jersey. He was proud of his Navy career.

Coming out of the service he continued with a commercial diving career. In the 1980's, he retired from diving and became a Captain in the U.S. Merchant Marines. In 1990, he retired to travel the world with his wife Joan. They enjoyed traveling in all 50 states and 75 countries on all seven continents. He was awarded a Guinness World Record in 2002 for the Largest Private Collection of Restaurant Menus which in 2008 he donated to the Broward Historical Commission.

We started attending the UWSS Reunions in the late 1990's and would drive to the location in our motor home. It was always wonderful to meet up with everyone and he really enjoyed sitting and swapping sea stories with you all.

Dan is survived by myself, his wife of 21 years, our combined four children, seven grandchildren, (one a Marine and one a U.S. Coast Guard), and two great grandchildren. He was devoted to all of his family and they to him. He will be greatly missed. Please remember Dan at your next reunion.

CHRISTIAN J. LAMBERTSEN 1917-2011

ADM (ret) Eric Olson was one of the guest speakers at the memorial service for Dr. Christian Lambertsen held in Philadelphia on 10 Oct 2011. Dr. Lambertsen died at age 93 on February 11, 2011.

Inventor, pioneer in undersea and aero-space medicine, medical doctor and professor at University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine, Dr. Lambertsen was extremely



influential in all diving matters related to our profession. He continued to help the NSW community throughout his life. He is also a recipient of the USSOCOM Medal.

During his medical school period, he invented and first used forms of the initial U.S. self-contained closed circuit oxygen rebreathing apparatus for neutral buoyancy



and underwater swimming diving. In 1940, he performed twelve SCUBA dives in his Lambertsen Amphibious Respiratory Unit (LARU) prototype in Lake Nokomis, Minnesota. The LARU was the first rebreather designed and built in the United States and these dives are the first closed-circuit oxygen dives in U.S. history.

As a student, he aided the early Office of Strategic Services (OSS) in establishing the first cadres of U.S. military operational combat swimmers. Dr. Lambertsen

became a U.S. Army medical officer on graduation from medical school in early 1943, and immediately joined the OSS Maritime Unit on active duty through its period of function in World War II. He joined the Pennsylvania University of Medical Faculty in 1946. While a faculty member he combined



diving research and further development of underwater rebreathing equipment for the Army and Navy.

Dr. Lambertsen has touched every aspect of military and commercial diving from the first U.S. military combat swimmers in the early 1940s through the evolutions of the U.S. Navy Deep Submergence and Naval Special Warfare developmental programs. He is recognized by the Naval Special Warfare community as "The Father of U.S. Combat Swimming."

The Way It Was



The three swimmers, engaged in cast and recovery from an LCPR of WW2 vintage, are wearing thin smooth rubber Pirelli dry suits to preserve body heat in cold water.

Why weren't they wearing wet suits? We didn't have them yet. The Pirelli suits had seals at waist and wrists but they weren't very effective, and of course a leaking dry suit doesn't keep you comfy

Today's dry suits, for very cold water, are made of heavy gauge rubber with warm under garments, sometimes heated.

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
