Swim School Scuba Show Entertains and Instructs

Lessons in laughter as well as scuba technique were the dividend paid to the audience at the Underwater Swimmers School's exhibition at the Naval Station EM pool on Saturday.

Tying instruction and entertainment into one enjoyable package, UWSS instructors and students combined to present a program outlining the history of scuba diving, from man's first attempt to swim up to the latest in technical diving equipment and operations.

Ad-libbing freely from a script written and narrated by Chief Yeoman Dow F. Byers, the UWSS personnel made certain that the combined audience of Sea Cadets, Sea Scouts, dependents and visiting members of the Nation Society of Underwater Swimmers of America had a grand old time as they watched the evolution of scuba diving unfold.

The idea, according to Chief Byers, was to "get away from the typical, dry, purely technical demonstration and let the audience enjoy themselves as they learned. And we had as much fun putting the show on as the audience did seeing it." Byers added.

The show started with an example of what may have happened when the first man chanced to enter the water and discovered, to his surprise, that it was different from land. Step by step, the UWSS instructors and students, among them Air Force, Marine and Naval personnel,

reviewed man's attempts to operate underwater.

Each step was presented as an experiment by some bright inventor, and each experiment required a "volunteer". – and an unwilling one. Instructor after instructor, acting out the part of volunteer, was pushed, pulled or hurled into the pool while the experimenters tried out their inventions. While to the audience it must have seemed a wild reckless affair, in fact the expert instructors were working under the strictest safety precautions.

One by one, the instructors "invented" diving masks and fins, open circuit scuba, the deep sea helmet, semi-closed Mark VI equipment, and closed circuit Emerson apparatus, as narrator Byers explained the significance of each goal.

Instructors participating in the program, and having a high time doing so, included Master Chief Patternmaker, R. N. Hewitt, Senior Chief Gunner's Mate John W. Hobbs, Chief Hospital Corpsman E Riojas, First Class Boatswain's Mate E. K Caltenback, First Class Aviation Machinist Mate J.F. Rabbitt and First Class Equipment Operator A. R. Hale.

Also participating were Lieutenant G. F. Young, Training Officer of the Swim School, and Chief Shipfitter E. A. Cahill, who acted as master of ceremonies and host to the visiting divers. Even 14 year old David Byers, the Chief's son, took a role in the performance.

"It was a ball" Chief Byers summed up, "and we're looking for an opportunity to do the show again."

He reciprocated, telling me his name was Bill D'Aoust, USN 1936-1959, a retired Navy Chief (E-7), 97 years old heading to a reunion of his ship, he included that it may be the last one. His daughter and adopted daughter were taking him on this journey. Bill currently lives in Bellingham, Washington.

Many of you will remember the movie THE SAND PEBBLES, starring Steve McQueen. Well Bill



was the radioman / engineer and photographer for that vessel. It was a coal powered gunboat, the USS Sacramento, PG-19, known as "The Galloping Ghost of the China Coast".

He was with the gunboat from China, all the way home. Bill joined early and stayed late. What a career. Bill talked and I listened. It was the most interesting LISTEN I have had in years. Bill told us that several years later, a duty station put him in close proximity to a group he knew as the "Underwater Swimmers". Bill did not just hang out with them, he swam and snorkeled with them. Bill's love for the water and his engineering background gave him the skills to actually build tanks using an Oxygen regulator from a B-17 Bomber. To that end, his daughter became the youngest person to ever, at that time, swim and breathe under water. She was five years old. I asked Bill to stay there and I would be right back.

I had a coin in the car, It was the new coin representing all the services with the Light Blue side with the Shark emblem on it. It says, U.S. Naval School,

Underwater Swimmers. Bill was thrilled as he had not heard that term used for over sixty years. I

had Colonel Jim Lucas to take this photo as I presented him with the coin.



I will be in touch with Bill in the near future as he lives in Bellingham and his daughters have invited me to come and peruse his photos and history. By the way, Bill was taken of his job as radioman and given orders to go to a base within a base. He told the Colonel and I that all he knew was that he was headed to work on something that he was never allowed to speak the word that named the project. That word.....RADAR. Bill is a very interesting man and he sends his best to all of you.
