

The label will be laminated and securely affixed to the burial container. The burial container will be a pint canning jar with one piece lid. The contents can be any memorialized material from the deceased, Ashes (preferably a partial amount, the rest reserved for gravesite) a part of his dive gear, uniform, personal mementos etc. The survivors may want to write a letter or any other item that will fit into a pint jar. Once deposited in the deep, the burial container will be filled with seawater and returned to the survivor.

Joseph Thomas Kennedy

Captain Joseph Thomas Kennedy (US Navy, Ret.) was born in Boston, Massachusetts on November 1, 1937, and passed away in Lauderdale By the Sea, Florida on December 10, 2022, after complications from surgery.

He is survived by three children, CAPT
Christopher Kennedy
(USN Ret.) and his wife
Robin of Virginia Beach,
VA, Robert Kennedy and
his wife Stephanie of
Stanley, NC, Dr.
Carole Ivey and her
husband David, of
Midlothian, VA, and 7
grandchildren,

and 4 great-grandchildren. He is also survived by his cousin, Russell Lindsay and his wife Sally of Ocean City, NJ.

Raised in Philadelphia, PA and then Somers Point, NJ, he was a 1955 graduate of Ocean City High School where he was a four-sport varsity athlete in football, basketball, baseball, and track. Joe was the leading scorer on the 1954-1955 team, winning the state basketball championship. When he graduated 67 years

ago, he was the all-time leading career scorer in school history and still ranks in the top 25. He was named to the OCHS All-Century teams in both basketball and baseball and was inducted into the Ocean City High School Athletic Hall of Fame in 2021. He graduated from LaSalle University. After college graduation he went on to law school at Villanova University. After one year of law school, he realized that practicing law was not his calling. Drafted to serve in the Army, he instead enlisted in the U.S. Navy and attended Officer Candidate School. This led to his serving for over 30 years, specializing in Explosive Ordnance Disposal and Mine Warfare. Senior Naval positions include Commanding the Naval Weapons Station Yorktown, Naval Explosive Ordnance Disposal Technology Center, the Naval Explosive Ordnance Disposal School, and the Atlantic Fleet EOD Forces. During this time, he also received master's degrees from both the Naval War College and Central Michigan University. Joe will be remembered for being a devoted husband to his wife Lynne of 57 years, a caring father, grandfather, and great-grandfather, and an exemplary leader and mentor. A burial with Military Honors will be scheduled later in Arlington National Cemetery.

Rudy's memoirs Continued from Nov 2022 BL In May, I hooked a fish, which I estimate would have weighed more than 175 pounds. I hooked the fish close to Demolition Island north of Fleming Key during the last stage of the incoming tide and shortly before the sun slid under the western horizon. I was using a black and silver 66M deep running Mirror Lure with the strike coming on my third cast. The fish initially headed west making three fantastic jumps, one of which perfectly silhouetted itself on the setting sun. It then reversed direction and ran to the center of seaplane drone where I fought it for a brief period. At high tide it headed north toward Calda Channel, trying to make its way over a shallow bar to the east of Demolition Island. The fish was in less than a foot of water. I had to ground the boat, jump out and follow it. I closed to where I could touch its tail and calculated the fish would soon be grounded by the outgoing tide. I was extremely nervous trying to maintain control. I kept telling myself to be patient. I was only a foot away from a really astonishing and sensational accomplishment. The tarpon was on its side and moving ever slowly to the east until it reached a three-foot propeller channel, which cut through the bar. The fish righted itself, reversed direction, and zoomed into the deep water to the south. My line was stripped before I could reach the boat, so my dream fish escaped. I was heartbroken. In hindsight, I should have jumped on the fish in an attempt to grab its gills. It would have been risky though with the plug still in its mouth. I would have been banged up, but it would have been worth it. This is one case where patience did not pay off. I will never get over this experience.

Division winners in the MMFT receive 8x10 inch wooden plaques, containing a gold metal casting of the fish caught along with an engraved flat metal piece giving name, division, type fish, weight and year caught. I have ten such trophies, which, besides the above, include plaques for pompano, barracuda, chiro, Bonita, mackerel, kingfish, and the 1959 tournament record cobia

(36lbs 6oz). I also have several boxes of citations for fish meeting certain size requirements for MMFT recognition. All toll, they stand as testimony to the many successful and pleasurable fishing adventures I was fortunate to experience while living in Key West. My fishing exploits gained me sufficient notoriety to be asked to participate as a guide in the First Annual World Series of Fishing. The high number of entries far exhausted the limited supply of guides available. It was on a weekend so I didn't mind pitching in, though I had to supply my own boat, gas and time without compensation. I would be fishing Joe Schebo, a Fort Lauderdale sportswriter, along with a fellow from Latin America. They could not have picked a worse day. The wind was strong with overcast skies, terrible conditions for bone fishing. We all met at the weigh in station and had the option of fishing anywhere so long as we returned in time for the 3PM weigh in. I chose to fish the area off Big Pine Key where I caught my winning MMFT bonefish. As it was impossible to sight cast for bonefish, I urged my party to have faith in the location and blind cast for the fish. After a short while, Joe had a strike, but it got cut off in the sharp coral. The way the line screamed off the reel I knew it was a bonefish. An hour later he hooked another fish and managed to land it, an 8 pounder. The guy from South America then tied into a fish, which broke off because he refused to lift his rod high. He too quickly hooked another bonefish, although it was smaller than Joe's fish. Again, he tied into a fish and lost it. I considered him a real pain since he would not listen to advice and complained the entire time. I kept reminding him that bone fishing wasn't like bottom fishing, and we surely had our share of opportunities. Of all the guides that fished the world's greatest fisherman that day, including Ted Williams and Sam Snead, only four fish were caught and half of them were caught off my boat. Had we landed all the fish, we not only would have won the tournament but also out produced the entire field. All this was noted by Vic Dunaway the

sportswriter for the Miami Herald. He featured me in an article entitled, "Meet Rudy Enders, King of the Met." The article's main point was that I had out performed all the famous guides in the Keys that day.

One late night I received a call from Jim Sumpter, head of the Key West Chamber of Commerce. He said Ted Williams was coming to town the following day to fish for tarpon. He would only be available for about four hours in the evening. I wasn't keen on the idea since the evening tide was incoming, a time when tarpon hardly feed. Nevertheless, I said yes. Ted was a likable guy but terribly spoiled. He did not take kindly when I told him the odds were slim of hooking a tarpon on artificial bait during the incoming tide. After

listening to him griping when cast after cast produced nothing, I assured him we would see tarpon at our next spot. I then took him to the Shrimp Dock basin where tarpon was always rolling. The only problem is they rarely hit artificial baits. When they do, however, it only takes a few jumps before they run around one of the many pilings and break free. Ted spotted several tarpon and seemed satisfied even though none of the fish were interested in his presentations. I invited him to try again later on an evening outgoing tide when I could guarantee success. He never took me up on the offer. The last thing he cared to talk about was baseball but digested ever word when it came to fishing. I was tempted to ask him about his Marine Corps fighter pilot experience, which in my view elevated him to hero status as a true American patriot willing to put his live on the line for his country in spite of his fame as perhaps the greatest baseball player in history but declined to do so since no fisherman is ever happy when the fish are not biting.
